### MINTER FUNERAL CHAPEL

ROCK PORT, MISSOURI

Dr. Loraine Boettner was born at Linden, Missouri, a community about seven miles northwest of Rock Port, Missouri, March 7, 1901, the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Boettner. He attended grade school at what was then Lone Cedar and Fairview schools, rural schools in Northwest Missouri. He attended Tarkio High School, then took a short course in agriculture at Columbia, Missouri, as he intended at



that time to be a farmer.

Following that work, however, he felt the need for further education and so entered Tarkio College. Graduating at Tarkio College in 1925, Cum Laude with a B.S. degree, he felt the call to some kind of Christian work, and so entered Princeton Theological Seminary in Princeton, New Jersey, where he spent four years in graduate study, finishing in 1929.

He then became Professor of Bible, in Pikeville, College, in Eastern Kentucky. He continued that work for eight years, and while there married Miss Lillian Henry, whose home had been in eastern Tennessee, and who also was a teacher in the College. While there he began his specialized work as a writer on theological subjects, and produced three books.

In 1937 he and his wife moved to Washington, D.C., where they continued to live for eleven years. Mr. Boettner was engaged in government work for a short time, but continued his writing and produced eight books, in all, all of which have gone through several editions. They continued to live in Washington until 1948. Those years included the Second World War, 1939 until 1945, at which time the United States gained a complete victory over both Germany and Japan. Those were most interesting years to be in Washington, as that city was then, in effect, the capital of the free world, with intense activity national and international.

In 1948 Mrs. Boettner's health began failing, and they moved to Los Angeles, California, where two of Mrs. Boettner's sisters lived, and who volunteered to help take care of her. She lived until 1958. During this time Mr. Boettner spent part time in Missouri and part time in California.

Dr. Boettner was preceded in death by his parents and one brother who died in infancy. He is survived by one brother, Clifford, who lives in Eureka Springs, Arkansas.

Dr. Boettner was a member of the Orthodox Presbyterian Church located in Westchester, Illinois.

Please rejoice over the home going of

At the time of his going home, Cancer  
had claimed his entire body. - His voice  
so soft you could barely understand. He  
seemed to be in no pain, just weak, unable  
to eat etc. Couldn't raise his hands - but always  
appreciate of things people did for him.

He refused blood transfusions or any  
thing that would just prolong his life.  
Wanted no part of becoming a vegetable.

Each time I would leave to go home  
he would say - "I'm ready to go home," and  
don't keep me alive by any artificial means.  
I assured him I would not.

Lorraine is now with his Lord (11 Corinthians 5:8  
"What a release, for which we are compelled  
to say " Praise you father for your faithfu-  
-ness to us, your children" What a joy he  
is experiencing with his loved ones, who  
have gone before. How can we be sad  
and sorrow - when he has graduated to such  
a place as heaven? Rejoice in the Lord  
always; and again I say "Rejoice" (Philippians 4
